1. Presentation of the subject

The course provides a sampling of current research in macroeconomics and international economics. The course is aimed at students who plan to pursue graduate studies in economics or those who want to go beyond the basic material covered in intermediate macro courses

- To develop an ability to evaluate empirically the predictions of those models
- To develop an ability to understand and evaluate critically a research program in economics
