Syllabus

International Constitutional Law is an optional subject within the specialist field of international studies. Its starting point is therefore knowledge acquired by students on the core course Public International Law and it aims to provide an in-depth study of the international legal system from the constitutional analysis perspective. In recent decades the international community has been evolving in a way which is highly important from a qualitative point of view. According to this approach, the process can be described as constitutional because it is possible to identify general values and interests of the whole international community. With the aim of regulating and protecting these common values and interests a set of international legal regulations and institutions has been created which also enable this process to be classified as the constitutionalising of public international law.

The course therefore aims to describe and analyse the most important features of this process and to interpret the evolution of international law as a legal system with a new conceptual framework. International regimes whose mission is to protect the common values and interests of the international community mentioned above are also examined: certain areas and resources that are outside national jurisdiction and are of interest to all; protecting the environment, the maintaining of international peace and security and the protection of the individual, (human rights and international humanitarian law). Finally, the international responsibility of the state and individuals for violating the international rules for protecting these general values and interests is studied.

The course takes an in-depth look at public international law and is closely related to others such as European Union Law, International Economic Law and European Constitutional Law.
